



SPECIAL ELECTION NOTICE FOR THE OFFICE OF PRESIDENT

Local 728 will hold a special election in 2006 for the office of President. Per the Constitution and Bylaws, the following parameters are required to be nominated for, and to hold, the office:

Section 4 - WRITE-INS

No write-ins shall be allowed.

Section 5 - NOMINATIONS FOR ONE OFFICE ONLY

No member shall be permitted to accept a nomination for more than one (1) office, this not to include nominations for election of delegates to conventions or Central Labor Council.

Section 6 - NOMINATIONS AND REQUEST FOR NOMINATIONS

a). In order to assure the most democratic nominations possible, all nominations will take place on the floor at the Membership meeting regardless of odd or even year, and that notice of such nominations to take place shall be put in Local 728 monthly newsletter "THE BULLETIN" prior to the meeting.

B). Any Member working in our jurisdiction, on the day of nomination, may send the Local a written request to place his name in nomination for any office; said request to be placed in nomination by the presiding officer of the meeting.

Section 7 - ELIGIBILITY

A person must have been a member of Local 728 for a period of two (2) years before he can become a candidate for any office, and further must be in good standing at the time of nomination. A member in good standing shall be any person who is not in arrears and who neither has voluntarily withdrawn from membership nor become inactive from membership nor has been expelled or suspended from membership.

Additional Bylaws include: Section 3 – RETIRED MEMBERS I.A. Retired Members shall not hold elective

Section 4 - FAILURE TO ATTEND

Non-salaried Officers who fail to attend three (3) meetings, both Executive Board and Membership within a twelve (12) month period without a satisfactory excuse, in writing, shall be recognized as vacating such office. This Section is not in conflict with Article 17, Section 16 of the Constitution.

ARTICLE 8 - NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS OF OFFICERS Section 1 - LENGTH OF TERMS OF OFFICE

President, Vice President, Business Representative-Secretary, Treasurer-Call Steward, Delegates to the I.A.T.S.E. & M.P.M.O. Convention, Delegates to the Central Labor Council of the Los Angeles County Federation of Labor, AFL-CIO shall be elected as hereinafter provided, and shall hold their office for a period of three (3) years or until their successor has been installed, as thereinafter provided.


Call Steward INFORMATION

Anyone who hires off roster or hires any member who is not current with their dues without first calling the Call Steward, shall have charges filed against them and shall be subject to the assessments levied by the Trial Board if found guilty.

Our present contract work week consists of any five (5) consecutive days out of seven (7) consecutive days.

and the palm trees, poles and plentiful Paramount parks. Add a 55-foot tall, remote dimmer controlled Christmas tree, wreaths, bows and all the trimmings, and you've got the makings of one elaborately decorated Hollywood lot.

Marc Naples headed up the crew of 10 members who spent approximately six weeks rigging Paramount with roughly 3,500 strands of lights. Virtually every area of the lot was transformed, from little spaces to large gathering areas.

Oftentimes during the painstaking process the crew had two or three condors

going at once, polemen were using extensions to reach taller trees and members were on ladders in narrow walkways. Blisters, thorn pricks, cuts, damaging Santa Ana winds and a few rain days couldn't keep the devoted crew off schedule. The goal: Have the lot lavishly decorated for the studio's huge holiday celebration in early December.

Local 728 members – who worked 10 hours a day sometimes six or seven days a week – included Karen Weilacher, John Gutierrez, Mike DeGrasse, Joe Fithian, Phil

Jacobson, Roger Bourse, Christina Stallard, Don Lewis, Diane Paniccia and Ken Roerden.

The crew worked hand-in-hand with numerous departments. "It was a combined effort – a full lot production," Naples explained. "From grounds and facilities people to the 40 shop and certified electricians, it was a huge process that involved many groups.

Fortunately for us, we got a lot of support from John Cybulski, the head of the set lighting department."

Using tie wraps, duct tape, string and staple guns, the Local 728 crew meticulously strung thousands of strands of various lights from the 50s style 'big bulbs' to newer lace lights. "It's very fun to do and out of the ordinary. But by the time you're finished you're worn out by the

minutia. It's ten hours straight on your feet. You contort your body to get into trees and bushes and it can be physically challenging. People have no idea the amount of work it takes," Karen Weilacher commented.

"This year, we added more color and detail, making it more traditional and at the same time making it better than last year. We wouldn't have been satisfied resting on last year's look," Naples said. "It's just like self-improvement; we already have ideas to make it better next year."

If the sheer delight from the nearly 3,000-strong attendees at the Paramount tree lighting party is any indication, the decorating crew outdid themselves this year. Following several late night dress rehearsals, the lighting department was

ready to unveil their masterpiece. Using a dimmer system from Europe, and the expertise of member Josh Thatcher, the group was ready for the party.

"It was all done remotely. We dimmed down the whole park at the precise time the tree was rigged to light with a wave effect. The lights started coming on at the bottom and worked up to the top.

8th Annual Local 728 Scholarship Awards

Your Local 728 officers and members are pleased to offer 10 scholarship awards to high school students graduating in 2006. Five awards in the amount of \$4,000.00 and five awards in the amount of \$2,000.00 will be presented in 2006.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

The rules of eligibility for the 8th Annual Local 728 Scholarship Awards state that an applicant must:

- a) Be the son/daughter of a member in good standing of Local 728.
- b) Be a high school senior at the time of application.
- e) Have applied, or about to apply for admission to an accredited college or university as a fully matriculated student.
- d) Have applied, or about to apply for admission to a vocational school.
- e) Use the scholarship award by the first term of the same year awarded.

HOW TO APPLY?

- An application is to be requested by completing the coupon below and forwarding same to Local 728 at the address below.
- 2. The application is then to be completed and returned to Local 728.
- A complete sealed copy of the applicant's high school transcript is also to be submitted to Local 728.
- 4. The record of scores achieved by the applicant on the Scholastic Aptitude Test, college entrance examination, or other equivalent examination may also be submitted, either by the student or by the testing organization.
- Letter(s) of recommendation should be submitted for inclusion in an applicant's file and will be accepted from any of the following: Teachers, Counselors, Clergy, Community Service Organizations, Employers, etc.
- In addition each applicant will be required to have a personal interview with the selection committee.

DEADLINE?

The deadline for filing all of the above required materials with Local 728 is March 3, 2006. The winners of the scholarship awards will be notified by Local 728 in May, 2006, and will be announced in a future issue of the *Local 728 Bulletin*.

Why it's important to call the hall

When it's Unsafe, Speak Up

I recently visited a set where a Technician told me of a situation on another stage at another studio that he felt was unsafe. He wondered if it had been fixed since he had not been back on that stage for over a year.

Since we are typically on stages for a very short time, such things can be forgotten or overlooked, or not addressed according to our needs once we are gone. This illustrates why it is important to let the Local know about any problems you might encounter on set. We have the means and ability to follow up on these situations and ensure that these problems are corrected so that the next crew will not have to face the same issues.

Speaking of set visits, I will frequently visit sets both with the Industry Wide Safety Committee and on my own initiative. When visiting your set, please remember that we are not there to check up on you but to make sure that the work environment is a safe one. Please feel free to discuss any issue with us that you believe concerns your health and safety.

Once again. I feel the need to stress the importance of good personal hygiene. A few illnesses have hit our sets and the best way to protect yourself and others is to wash your hands frequently and to never eat any fruits or vegetables before they are washed.

When the star was lit, fireworks went off. It was really incredible," Naples recalled.

Last minute changes – like moving the location of the Christmas tree requiring a change in power or adding multi-colored sphere lights to Producer's Park – was all worth it.

"The main thing about the crew is they have an attention to detail on a large scale. We had to consider safety issues, yet we kept a tight, clean focus. You can't see any extension cords or power runs," Naples noted. "They were so dedicated to the project. They wanted to do their best and it shows. We're very pleased with the outcome" From the days when Clark Gable and Lucy were frequently found on the lot, Paramount has made holiday decorating and the tree lighting celebration an annual event. Many other Hollywood studios have either ceased the tradition or scaled back to only minor decorating. But not the classic, old studio; in fact this year, they stepped it up a notch further to celebrate new Paramount head Brad Gray's tenure at the facility.

The yearly lavish display couldn't be done without the professionalism and dedication of Marc Naples and the 728 crew. "Marc is one of the most conscientious, kind, organized and


