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

# Interviews, scams, the picnic, boycotts and the NLRB

I have been receiving many calls regarding physical interviews with the State Unemployment Office. For the most part, it's a three-minute stop in to say, "hi." There could be many different reasons why the unemployment office wants to see you in person. So, the only thing I can recommend is that if you have received the notice to go in for an unemployment interview, just do it.

Speaking of keeping appointments, I know that all of you are civically responsible for jury duty and make every effort to serve when called upon. However, it has come to my attention that there could be an identity theft scam linked to jury summons.

In the alleged scam, a jury coordinator calls threateningly saying a warrant has been issued for your arrest because of a no-show for jury duty. You, of course, protest of never receiving such a summons. The "jury coordinator" then asks for your social security number and date of birth so they can verify the information and cancel the arrest warrant. In some instances, they are going so far as to request credit card numbers. As with all of these scams, providing any of these numbers typically results in getting your identity stolen. This scam linking jail time with a jury summons is novel and very clever, and one I wanted to bring to your attention.

Many members have been asking about the annual picnic. I am happy to say that the Locals 728, 729, 80 and 44 Picnic will return to the Calamigos Ranch in Malibu on Sunday, October 15th at 10 a.m. Ticket prices are \$12.00 and are available from the Lot Stewards or at the Hall. Ticket prices one week before the event will be \$15.00 and available at the office. If you wait until the day of the event, the ticket price is \$20.00 at the door.

As in the past, the popular event will have rides, games, door prizes, food, and all kinds of fun-filled outdoor activities for every age group. It's a great time for the whole family, and gives all of us a chance to socialize with co-workers in a relaxed, festive atmosphere.

On a different note, since all of you heard me speak of this at the last union meeting, I will be caught repeating myself: The NLRB has three cases referred to as the "Kentucky River" decisions which date back to 2001. These cases encompass three employers and their unions: the Golden Crest Health Care Center (USW), Croft Metals, Inc. (boilermakers), and the Oakwood Healthcare, Inc. (UAW), and concern nurses in long term care facilities and supervisors at a manufacturing plant.

In these decisions, workers who "supervise" other workers in their normal daily job could be reclassified as supervisors. The interpretation of who is a supervisor could allow employers to restrict workers on their rights to protection and representation. Moreover, these cases have been left open by the Supreme

# Section 5 - NOMINATIONS FOR ONE OFFICE ONLY

No member shall be permitted to accept a nomination for more than one (1) office, this not to include nominations for election of delegates to conventions or Central Labor Council.

## Section 6 - NOMINATIONS AND REQUEST FOR NOMINATIONS

a). In order to assure the most democratic nominations possible, all nominations will take place on the floor at the Membership meeting regardless of odd or even year, and that notice of such nominations to take place shall be put in Local 728 monthly newsletter "THE BULLETIN" prior to the meeting.

B). Any Member working in our jurisdiction, on the day of nomination, may send the Local a written request to place his name in nomination for any office; said request to be placed in nomination by the presiding officer of the meeting.

#### Section 7 - ELIGIBILITY

A person must have been a member of Local 728 for a period of two (2) years before he can become a candidate for any office, and further must be in good standing at the time of nomination. A member in good standing shall be any person who is not in arrears and who neither has voluntarily withdrawn from membership nor become inactive from membership nor has been expelled or suspended from membership.

Additional Bylaws include:

#### Section 3 - RETIRED MEMBERS

1.A. Retired Members shall not hold elective office in Local 728.

#### Section 4 - FAILURE TO ATTEND

Non-salaried Officers who fail to attend three (3) meetings, both Executive Board and Membership within a twelve (12) month period without a satisfactory excuse, in writing, shall be recognized as vacating such office. This Section is not in conflict with Article 17, Section 16 of the Constitution.

# ARTICLE 8 - NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS OF OFFICERS

#### Section 1 - LENGTH OF TERMS OF OFFICE

President, Vice President, Business Representative-Secretary, Treasurer-Call Steward, Delegates to the LA.T.S.E. & M.P.M.O. Convention, Delegates to the Central Labor Council of the Los Angeles County Federation of Labor, AFL-CIO shall be elected as hereinafter provided, and shall hold their office for a period of three (3) years or until their successor has been installed, as thereinafter provided.


# Call Steward INFORMATION

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# Benefits!? What the Employer Pays that we Don't See!

Greetings everybody! The town is getting busy. If you think you are on the books and accept a job, <u>please</u> call. In the past month, the availability list has gone from nearly four hundred (400) members to less than one hundred fifty (150).

Two months ago, I referenced the current IATSE "Organizer" and its overview of our recently negotiated pension and health benefits. Since then, all of you should have received your yearly statement showing your hours worked and reported to Contract Services last year.

Depending on when your health benefit qualifying begins, you should have also received new health plan cards. Take notice of the fact that the Plan has changed insurance carriers from Blue Cross (if that is the coverage you have chosen) to Blue Shield, which means you will be receiving a second (replacement) health plan card.

Let's move on to this month's theme. Benefits. Over the last few years, several members have asked me, "How much does the employer pay towards our benefits?" Since the new contract recently went into effect and having had to actually do the calculations for the Local's payroll (it took me a few attempts to get it right), I will try to explain it as simply as I can.

Starting at the beginning, every three years the IATSE and the AMPTP renegotiate our contract. It takes many people many hours, and a lot of give and take, to arrive at the monies that are finally negotiated into the contract.

Items included in the negotiated employer contributions are the Pension/Health Contribution Rate (P/HCR @ \$ 3.6375 per hour worked), these are contributions to Active Health, Retiree Health, Pension and IAP accounts; contributions to the Contract Services Administration Trust Fund (CSATF @ \$.2600 per hour worked); and our Individual Account Plan Percentage Contribution (IAP % @ 5% of gross earnings of all hours worked), this is the money that becomes available to you when you retire.

Confused? Let me show you how this breaks down through two examples using a low budget wage rate and a full scale Basic Agreement rate:

When looking at these numbers, there are two points I would like to bring to your attention: Notice that the contributions for the P/HCR and the CSATF are identical regardless of the hourly rate, and the only difference in the total amount is the IAP. Also remember that as you work more hours the employer is paying out more money directly to you and toward benefits. Of course, none of this explanation takes into account taxes that are withdrawn from your checks.

This concludes this month's discussion. I hope it helps to take out some of the mystery and confusion about the employers' contributions. Call me with your questions, and I'll do my best to answer them.

# Precautions needed when working with Multi-Cables

Multi-cables, such as Socapex, have become standard on our sets and stages. While the multi-cable has many advantages it also has a few drawbacks. It is important to remember that like any cable, multi-cables need to be run and managed to avoid heat buildup. In addition to voltage drop, heat buildup can also melt the cable's insulation and cause a fire. With twelve of the nineteen conductors in a multi-cable carrying a current, heat buildup is a serious concern.

The nature of our work will often push the limits of the capabilities of our equipment. This especially applies to the multi-cables that have a manufacturers rating of 2000W per circuit. We should consider that the conditions under which the manufacturer intended this equipment to be used more than likely does not reflect the conditions we frequently have on set.

A run of 200' to a dimmer room is not at all uncommon and with some multicables, line loss can be an issue on a 50' run with a load of six circuits at 2000W. High ambient temperatures, such as in the perms, will further restrict the cables' ability to disperse heat and cause even more line loss. With multi-cables in particular, it's very important to ensure they are not bundled together or stacked, which will also cause the cable to overheat.

Connections are always the weakest link and need to be checked regularly, particularly in areas like the perms and greenbeds where people are working or walking frequently. A loose connection can easily start a fire.

In addition to properly running the cable, the best way to avoid problems with multi-cable is to avoid overloading it. Even though some manufacturers rate their cables for 2000W, in consideration of our long cable runs and high ambient temperatures on set, 1200W (10A) is a recommended maximum sustained load for each circuit in a multi-cable. It is also recommended that any circuits that are near their capacity be saved between takes at the Lighting Console. Interestingly enough, this advanced technology brings us back to the days of "LIGHTS! CAMERA! ACTION!"
