
























the 2007 Scholarship Recipients

If we want a stronger union, we need to round up all of these producers and demand a contract. Those contracts include terms of agreement and set wage scale, health and pension benefits and a complete package of working conditions that you would never get working for producers who don't want to sign a contract. Besides that, it is your obligation to report any employer who does not maintain a minimum standard when it comes to working conditions.

As I said last month, we are in a tidal surge of positive union action here in Hollywood. Let's keep the ball rolling. Call in shows you know are non-IA. Most of the lower budget shows want to strike a deal. It's the ones that want to abuse and dump crews as soon as they hear there might be a labor action on their set that everyone has problems with.

So, no matter if you are working on the big hits or the sleepers and snorers, you should all be afforded the working conditions of a union contract.

During the first week of June, Local 728 hosted its first retirees' quarterly get together. Over 20 members showed up and they all got to tell stories that the rest of you weren't there to verify. It was held at the Motion Picture Home and a better day couldn't have been asked for. Hillary Tilden

from St. Joseph High igh School in Lakewood with a 4.33 GPA. She plans on studying biology/speech pathology in college.




In addition, Salma is also a certified lifeguard and CPR instructor who volunteered her time teaching life-saving skills.

Let Us Know, Revisited

reetings everybody! Summertime for our business is almost over and I hope those of you who are "on the books" are ready to work. This "Bulletin" will probably be in your hands well after the 4th of July and, very soon, the usual television season starts. There are several features in pre-production or already in production, with a few actually taking Local 728 crews on distant location.

The "Books" have been moving very slowly; few shows are calling the office to dispatch our members, except for the low budget shows. My recommendation is to call everybody you know if you really need to work.

Anyway, let's get to the theme, "Let Us Know."

Last year, I wrote about your responsibility as a member to keep the Local informed of address/phone changes and third party checks. This time the focus is on being in arrears in

Throughout our lives, at least 85% of us will experience some kind of financial hardship. It may occur when we are young (when it's easier to bounce back), in middle age, or when we are getting close to retirement.

The Business Representative and I receive many calls each quarter from members who are unfortunately two quarters in arrears in their dues payments

and ask the Local for help. Many times this happens because the member got injured on the job or off the job. The member did not think the injury would put him/her out of work for a long time (meaning a week or two). Five months later, his/her doctor still will not release him/her back to work because the member has not recovered fully from the injury. Now the member is two quarters behind in his/her dues payments and asking for assistance.

Other scenarios include, but are not limited to, caring for an ill relation (generally, a parent, locally or in a distant state), injuries suffered in an automobile accident, and situations that are completely out of an individual's control. I only present these scenarios because this is what the Local office hears on a weekly basis.

I urge every member, if you find vourself in a financial crisis or foresee one in your near future, please contact your Local union. While the Local has extremely limited abilities to help our members financially, we may be able to help you connect with an organization that can provide you with assistance.

In closing, I want to remind all ACLTs and Rigging Gaffers that you are still required per the Constitution & By-laws to report to the Local your crews, when starting a show and any new hires for

Important Information About CEM+ Dimmers by Alan M. Rowe,

Safety & Training Director



It is important to make sure that the CEM+ Dimmers that you are getting from the rental shops have Version 1.2 software installed on them. Version 1.2 has a Basic/Portable Mode that was designed just for the motion picture industry.

When Basic Mode is enabled all you need to do is hit the checkmark icon and the module will take you directly into addressing mode. From there, use the up/down arrows to select your start address and then hit the checkmark icon again to exit addressing mode.

A majority of the field service calls that ETC has performed have been related to the CEM+ modules not having this update or not having been placed into Basic Mode at the shop. The version number is visible during the start-up sequence and with version 1.2 the second line of text in the Main Menu during normal operating mode will display:

A: {start address} B: {start address} E: {start address}

If you do not have version 1.2 installed or you need to put the CEM + into basic mode, call ETC Technical Support.

If you have any further questions or need assistance with your CEM+ Dimmer Racks, please contact Dave Tramontina or Alan Faulkner of ETC Technical Support at 323-461-0216. If you reach their voice mail, press 2 and your call will be forwarded to their mobile phone.

Our Training Program has become more interactive with classes that can be scheduled at the convenience of your crew. If you would like to have your crew trained in specific Lighting Consoles, Electrical Power theory, DMX Networking, Dimming Technology, a specific vendor's product or just about any other class we offer (with the notable exception of Vectorworks) we can find a way to make it happen.

Another way that we can bring the training to you is with the Local's new Power Quality Meter. The Fluke 434 provides a visual display of your electrical power and will show you in real-time the effects of harmonics caused by dimmers, HMI & fluorescent ballasts, and moving lights. We will be happy to bring it to your set and take a look at your power.

Very soon we will also be offering certification classes in CPR/AED that will be available to any member of the Local and their families.

Many of our members have talents, skills, or products that are exceptional and would benefit our membership. If you are one of these members and would like to participate in our Training Program or would like to be involved with outside professional organizations like ESTA, ETCP, or LDI, please let me know. It is important that we make our presence known to these organizations by showcasing the talents and superior skills of our members to the rest of the Entertainment Lighting Industry.
